# From the Pastor

#### **Welcoming New Life**

Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. John 12:24 NRSV

With the appearance of Spring, we've been planting new azaleas and gardenias in our front yard, pulling out the 25 -year-old failing yews. The presentation is delightful, as are the comments of neighbors passing by. The new bright colors speak of hope and life. No one talks about dying yews.

Lent is the season Christians reflect on dying and rising again. It's a strange discipline in post-modern society. Technology and medicine have pushed death into hidden corners, making death an infrequent experience. Our entertainment is filled with enough gratuitous violence to make death surreal, leaving us unprepared when it shows up. We meet death usually only in our family when an elder passes on and it triggers all of our emotions. This rollercoaster ride of the highs and lows, twists and turns, of life and death predisposes us to give fear more power than it is due. Trusting in the wisdom of the ages seems insufficient to restrain the anxiety and distress rushing through our bloodstream. Among God's creatures, only humanity so perverts the life cycle.

Maturing, bearing fruit, and then dying so the future may be born from the seeds that fall to Earth is the life cycle of creation. Jesus understood and pointed to this principle of existence. He did not fear death. He saw his death as the gateway to the propagation of the life that endures for all ages. He saw his forthcoming death as the gift of life for us across generations, time and space.

The Lutheran Urban Parish of Tampa is arising from seeds fallen to Earth. St. Paul and Faith both have storied histories. St. Paul has gone through three lifecycles; Faith has gone through two. Together we are going through another one. With each lifecycle, new ministries supplant former ministries and the sense of mission responds to the present community needs rather than what used to exist.

At one time, electric streetcars ran past St. Paul and Hillsborough High School students gathered in the sanctuary before the school day for morning prayer. Those things are not coming back. But a concern for public transit and helping students respond violence on campus could be mission concerns that arise from the seeds of the past. Examples.

Beginning next month, the Lutheran Urban Parish will officially receive Dr. Gabriel Morgan as our pastoral intern in the TEEM Internship program of the ELCA. Both congregations have had sons and daughters become pastors. Now we will help shape a pastor - and the pastoral intern help shape us.

The TEEM program is about providing a space for special pastoral candidates to develop emergent ministries. The restructured Parish Ministry Board will be helping to discern how emergent ministry takes shape among us. One of the keys to emergent ministry is to let the skills and passion of members and mission partners lead in developing new ministries. Vicar Gabriel will help provide leadership in this process. (Interns go by the ministerial title vicar.)

As we move forward in this new moment of the life of the parish and its congregations, new possibilities will unfold for putting our faith in action and engaging people in the community. I pray that you will find a place to connect your sense of ministry and discipleship with the new growth the Spirit is bring about among us.

Please pray for the parish in our bold step forward with the internship. Also consider giving additional support for ensuring its success. And most of all, participate in the new things that God is doing among and with us.

In this Lenten season we are encouraged toward self-reflection. I think this is a good idea, to sort of reassess where we are in our Christian life. I like to think about Jesus' journey and his understanding of what was to come and contrast that to ours. We never know where life will take us, and as someone who has experienced personal tragedy, I understand that sometimes we must just accept. Discernment, listening. That's what we are called to do in lent. Sometimes the listening is the hardest part. Letting life happen as we travel our journey. Not so easy, but with faith and trust it is liberating. Let us travel thoughtfully together, rejoicing in the renewal.

### FROM THE PARISH DEACON

#### "I Will, and I Ask God to Help Me!"

As most of you know last Sunday evening, February 24, we had a special service for my Florida-Bahamas Synod, Parish Deacon Commissioning. I spent about two years attending courses on Saturday mornings that included study about being an ELCA Lutheran and about being a Christian in general. I started out this journey looking for how I could learn more about my faith and, quite frankly, looking for meaning. I wanted to be closer to God so I could learn how to overcome my own sadness and disappointments that had left me feeling lost and confused. As I worked through the courses and did some reflective prayer, I began to understand that it was not about what I was going to get out of serving the church but it was about truly surrendering to God's will; it was about sharing His peace by serving others.


As a part of the commissioning service, Pastor Meyer was gracious enough to allow me to choose the readings for the service. I chose, Micah 6:6-8, 1 John 4:7-21 and for the Gospel reading, Matthew 7: 1-14. All three of these readings are words that have inspired me but, more importantly, they have humbled me. When I read Micah 6, I reminded of what God calls us all to do; to act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with Him. When I read 1 John 4, especially vs 18 "there is no fear in Love", I am reminded that if I am truly commented to serve, I must do this with the Love of our Father, one that is grounded in Loving ALL of His children without fear. When I read Matthew 7, I am reminded of the great love that Jesus came to share with all of us, and He clearly defines what actions we must take, and we don't need to fear, because as He shares with us in vs 7, we should trust and have faith and in vs 12, He reminds us that "in EVERTHING, do to others as you would have them do unto you".

In Matthew 7 vs 14, Jesus tells us that "small is the gate and narrow is the road that leads to life, and only a few find it." In his sermon last week, Pastor Meyer explained that to go down this narrow path means to love and serve others in this world without expecting anything in return. I have been thinking about this a lot since then. I pray that my ministry as a Deacon for

Lutheran Urban Parish will be one that will take me down this narrow path. In my ministry as a deacon, I plan to continue to assist our pastor with pastoral care, contribute music to both of our churches, continue to volunteer with The Well, and I want to work with our Pastor to support immigrants and refugees in helping those who have been forced to leave their countries to escape persecution, resettle and integrate into new communities.

I started this journey looking for meaning in my life and I have that found meaning. Yes, this journey through the diakonia training for two years has helped learn more about what it means to be Lutheran and it has brought me closer to God but the biggest thing I have realized is that this calling is not about me. I am no longer pondering the need to overcome sadness and disappointment because I now know that it isn't about expecting something in return. As a part of the commissioning service last week, Pastor Meyer asked me, "Will you witness in word and deed, and by your own example encourage God's people in faithful service and holy living? "and I responded: "I will, and I ask God to help me." I invite you to join me on this journey. May the peace of the Lord be with you always!




#### PARISH ASSOCIATE

### Try Something New?

Do you want to shake up your giving, or did you make a resolution to give more, but don't know how to ease into it? Or as part of your Lenten journey, you want to try a new kind of sacrifice. Here are a couple methods you can use that are painless and you will find that giving is easier than you thought.

First up is called the Try-a-Tithe Sunday. Pick a Sunday, and instead of your regular giving, give a tithe. This may be a big jump for you or a small step. Either way, pay attention in the next week or two, and see that God will provide for you, and you will not want. Maybe try it again next time or next month. Soon you will see it is easy to do.

Another method to try if you want to start giving, is to start with a dollar the first week. The second week give two dollars, the third week three dollars, the fourth week four dollars, and so on for a year. The last week would be \$52. So over the course of the year you will have given over \$1,300 and each week you would have given only a dollar more than the week before. Some weeks you might even find that additional dollar in change in your sofa!
