An Outline of the Parish and Our Ministry in God's Mission

So, being sent out by the Holy Spirit ... Acts 13:4

God's mission of love has sustained St. Paul and Faith Lutheran Churches throughout the years, in lean times and in feast years. I was reminded of that driving down Florida Avenue recently and seeing Nikko's Diner shuttered, an icon of Seminole Heights. The family run-restaurant couldn't pass on its traditions and keep up with new clientele. The sign, "Elvis ate here!", no longer drew customers. I suspect the business-side of things had become more difficult, and the opportunity to cash out because of gentrification was too great to reject.

The neighborhoods in our parish are changing on both sides of I275. Along Florida and Nebraska Avenues, new restaurants are opening after tearing down or refurbishing old buildings. These eating establishments indicate that a new economy is emerging in the community; one that new residents can afford. And that means displacement of those who have lived in the area but lacked the disposable income to eat out regularly.

Lutheran Urban Parish of Tampa: what's in a name? Shakespeare once wrote that a rose by any other name would smell just as sweet. The poet suggests what a thing is matters more than what it is called. Nonetheless, our name has some specific meanings.

A parish is a geographical area to which a ministry has responsibility for the care of the inhabitants. A parish includes all the people in the its boundaries. That's different from a congregation, which is defined by membership. Our ministry at St. Paul and Faith thus bears concern for everyone in the parish as well as providing spiritual care to the members of the two congregations.

By naming the setting of the parish as urban, we recognize that the areas around us have needs that differ from folks who live in rural or suburban areas. Our concerns are shaped by urban life, about what it means to live in the city and specifically the urban core of Hillsborough County. For instance, a recent comparative study showed that the county is fourth from the bottom in social mobility among the 100 most populated counties in the nation. The lack of social mobility indicates the extent of impoverishment in a community.

More importantly, by claiming Lutheran identity for this parish, we are recognizing the power of God's grace to be a transformative agent in the community and with its people. As people of Christian faith, we identify with the trauma and suffering around us as a reflection of Jesus' suffering on the cross, knowing that the risen Christ redeems those whom others sacrifice to the local economy.

In the weeks and months ahead, our Parish Ministry Board will be engaging both congregations in conversation about how we shall engage God's mission of love in this parish. The board recently discussed the boundaries of the parish that constitute our geography of concern. The rough contour is more or less a three-mile wide area around Florida Avenue that runs from Columbus to Fletcher Avenues, an area bounded by downtown Tampa on the south side, Carrollwood to the west, Lake Magdalene to the north, and Temple Terrace to the east. The largest proportion of households in the county living below the poverty-line are in our parish, which also is seeing gentrification – or displacement of the impoverished – in many of its neighborhoods.

We've already initiated a number of ministries intended for people in the parish, including the Well at the Good Samaritan, pub theology, tutoring, the community garden, and daycare at Faith. Many of the public issues that I engage through the Florida Council of Churches include ministry partners in this parish. The opportunities for ministry in the parish are many. The TEEM internship that Gabriel Morgan will begin shortly will focus on developing these ministry opportunities. I'm excited about the prospects for our congregational life and for what God is doing through us.

"I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." This verse from Isaiah 43:19 speaks volumes for us. Isaiah speaks to the exiled community about how God is turning the tide of history and they are to be released and sent home to Jerusalem. Their days of lament and mourning are drawing to a close. The impossible has now become possible through a unpredictable change of circumstances.

God's promises are for us as well. The Christian life unfolds through the words of Jesus, and Jesus promises that we will bear fruit if we stay with his words. Whatever our parish ministry turns out to be, God will bring it to fruition. Our charge is to remain true to nothing less than the Beatitudes of Jesus. As we learn the neighborhoods of the parish and reflect on the words of Jesus, we'll know what the Holy Spirit is sending us to do. So, I commend Jesus' words to your heart and memory.

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

"Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.

"Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.

"Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

"Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

"Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. ¹² Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.

God's Love and Forgiveness Found Everywhere

As most of you know, I love to travel. Just this past year alone I went to Scotland, South Korea and Singapore. Just recently, I was in Hawaii for business and I spent some time on the Big Island where I attended a service at Lutheran Church of the Holy Trinity, an ELCA church located in Kona. Their service was much like ours but they had an additional hymn they sang after communion. This hymn was the Queen's Prayer, written by Queen Lili'uokalani, the first queen and last monarch of the Kingdom of Hawaii. She wrote this hymn when she was imprisoned in 1895. Apparently she was a very religious woman and wrote many hymns. She wrote this song for Princess Ka'iulani, her heir apparent to the throne. According to historians, the Queen hoped that she will be able to find the strength to forgive their adversaries for denying their birthright as monarchs. Here is the English translation of the hymn:

*"Oh look not on our failing,
Nor on the sins of men.
Forgive with loving kindness
That we might be made pure."*

As I read the lyrics and sang with the congregation it struck me that we were singing about one of the greatest actions of love that our savior Jesus taught us: forgiveness. When I heard the story about Queen Lili'uokalani regarding how badly she had been treated but still insisted on forgiveness, I was truly humbled. Some historians

argue that this was a hymn of protest and not forgiveness, but I would argue that it is both. For this is what Christ calls us to do. To stand up for those who have been mistreated and forgive those who have mistreated them. Not just because God commands us to do so but also because this is a part of shared humanity. In forgiveness we find fellowship and there lies the love and grace of our creator. I have been to many countries and while I have met people whose religion and culture are drastically different than ours, I have found that we all value compassion, forgiveness, grace and love. This is what makes us all part of God's great family. This is what makes it possible for me to go to a service in a place where I am not a resident and after the service feel like part of the church family there...because I am! Because we all are! God's love and forgiveness IS found everywhere because we carry them with us in our hearts! Go in peace and serve the Lord!

Stewardship

Thank God for our families

[Jesus was dying on the cross.] When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother, "Woman, here is your son." Then he said to the disciple, "Here is your mother." -John 19:26-27

On the second Sunday of this month we celebrate the mothers and mother figures in our lives, and then in June we celebrate our fathers and father figures. What a wonderful opportunity to honor the strong bond between parents and children. How strong? The first use of the word "love" in the Bible, Genesis 22:2, describes the connection between Abraham and his son, Isaac.

Family is one of our most valuable gifts from God, and one that, as all holy gifts, we are entrusted to treasure, love and nourish. As parents, we are responsible for nourishing children to become healthy adults. And as children, we are responsible for caring for parents as they age.

Jesus indicates in the passage above that there need not be a blood connection for a parent-child relationship (as any family with adopted children can attest). In Matthew 12:46-50, Jesus actually redefines family, saying that all who love and follow him are mothers, brothers, sisters, fathers. So, all of us are parent, child and sibling to one another. Now THAT'S some family!

As we honor the mother and father figures this spring, we can also challenge ourselves to be better stewards of the family bonds God has given us.

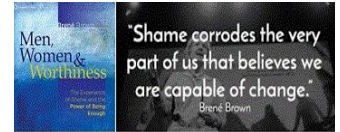
- Explore through Scripture what it means to be a family, including a faith family.
- Work with your congregation promote healthy family connections.
- Support and accompany families that are in crisis or paralyzed by dysfunction.
- Learn about foster-parent programs and support foster families.
- Explore and support Big Brother and Big Sister programs. Be a mentor to a child or youth.
- Befriend a senior citizen who may not have children (or children nearby).
- Remember that not all family relationships are positive. Avoid judgment and listen thoughtfully to those whose experiences may differ from yours.
- With your congregation, explore ways to live as brothers and sisters, mothers and fathers to one another.

God ordained families to be the fundamental unit of human life. We can be good stewards of family relationships by caring for one another and helping everyone to grow into the faith family God intends.

I would like to invite you to a new study group that meets every **Thursday at 6:30pm in the Lounge at St Paul**. Meditation seems to enjoy some popularity today. Modern science has begun to better understand the benefits of mindfulness for reducing stress and finding greater peace and balance in one's life. Yet meditation comes in many forms, from the more physical styles of yoga and tai chi, to the sitting meditations of Buddhism. Every week, we have meditation in the sanctuary at St Paul at noon. Our practice is in the Christian tradition of *lectio divina*, as adapted by Luther and later Lutherans. If you'd like to learn more about meditation and its benefits, I'd like to invite you to join us for a new study group called *Introduction to Meditation: Buddhist and Christian Perspectives*. I have asked a longtime friend of mine, Justin Carpenter, to participate and offer some of his own knowledge and experiences as a Christian and lifetime practitioner of Buddhism. In this group, I hope that we will have an opportunity to do some interfaith dialogue and learn more about the insights the Buddhist tradition offers, as well as to learn about those aspects of our own tradition with which we may be unfamiliar. New Sunday School Study

What makes us worthy? What gives us our sense of identity and self-worth? Is it our job, education, talent, house, what we buy, our relationships, or something else? Have you ever been in a situation that made you feel unworthy, inadequate, or less than? For example, have you ever been in a situation where someone put you down and it made you feel like time seemed to slow down, your heart raced, your mouth got dry, and you were looking down or even having tunnel vision?

According to Dr. Brené Brown, this experience is called "shame." Dr. Brown defines "shame" as the feeling a person has when they feel like they are bad or unworthy. We all experience shame at times in our lives, but we may experience shame for different reasons. The world has all kinds of standards for worthiness. Sometimes we may achieve the successes the world tells us we must in order to feel worthy, and then we are puffed up with a sense of pride and superiority over others. Or we may experience these standards as oppressive, like we never measure up, and are always under the judgmental eye of family and friends.

What does God's Word have to say about all of this? I invite you to join a new study for Sunday School on Sunday mornings at 9:15am. For the next several weeks, we will explore the dynamics of shame, the differences between God's standards of worthiness and the world's, and the good news of Jesus Christ, who gives us his own worthiness freely on account of his life, death, and resurrection.

This hymn text is set to two different tunes in our hymnal (Fredericktown and Engelberg). It is a fitting reminder of the importance of music in worship. Our last choir rehearsal before our summer break will be Wednesday, May 16. The choir will sing on Pentecost Sunday (May 20) at both services (Faith and St. Paul). However, just because the choir takes a well deserved break from rehearsals doesn't mean music stops. We still need Cantors to lead parts of the liturgy, such as the Psalm. May 6 – Rachel's Day is a time set aside to mourn the loss of our children and to renounce forces of evil and fear that plague our Nation. The day takes its name from Jeremiah 31:15-17.

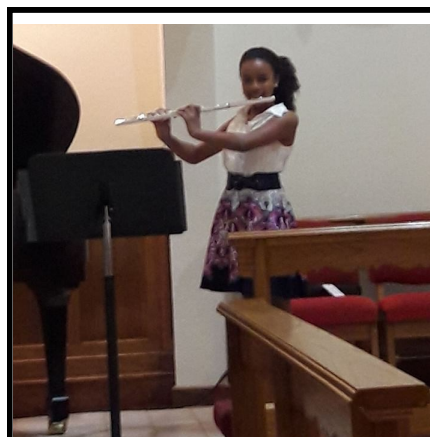
