#### A Parish of Providence

Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For it is on him that God the Father has set his seal. John 6:27

School is around the corner, and next week is school supply tax break. Soon the roadways will fill up with traffic again.

The rainy season is upon us and we head into our most likely months for hurricanes. So far the named storms have been limited, as meteorologists expected. But a deluge of rain can come at any time. That's one of the telling signs of climate change. On an annual basis our overall rainfall remains constant, but we have drier dry months and wetter wet months. This shift in weather patterns means more standing water and potential flooding because the ground becomes too saturated for the rain to dissipate quickly. These months are also when the full moon is closer to us, pulling the tides to their highest yearly levels.

August and September are when big storms hit us. Think about the supplies you need and where you will shelter. During Irma, many people tried to flee inland only to find the storm went that way too. It's best to find a local shelter and be prepared to go when it opens. It will be easier to get home when the storm passes. Last year St. Paul proved to be a very adequate shelter and we may consider that again – especially since we now have hurricane windows in the Snyder Building.

You might want to do your storm preparation shopping next week during the school supply tax break.

When Jesus talks about toiling over things that perish, he's talking about how we get caught up in making things

work out nicely for ourselves. He wants us to listen to him so that we focus on the good that endures for everyone. Every generation faces the question of staying alive and how to get by. Truth be told, our generation here in North America has it easier than just about any that has come before us. But nonetheless we worry – perhaps we worry even more because of the many ways our various conveniences could break down and what challenges that would do to our schedules. I'm currently ruminating over my seven-year-old car with high mileage and looming repair bills. It would be nice to have a new car. But that one won't last forever either.

Researchers have learned that our brains wire themselves based on where we focus. Give attention to daily anxieties, worries, and concerns and the brain creates quick pathways for being upset by what's going on around us. Pay attention to matters that have longevity and produce goodness for others, and we see hope and possibility everywhere. Our brains don't tell us where to go; they follow our consciousness.

The Gospel readings for August come from the Bread Discourse in John 6. After feeding the 5000 families in a remote verdant meadow, Jesus returns to Capernaum. The disciples and crowds follow him there. Much of John 6 is a homily from the synagogue contrasting the former understanding of the manna of Moses with the bread that Jesus gives. Scholars find in the discourse elements of the deep rifts that arose from Jesus' ministry in the years following the resurrection. Those rifts eventually led to the people of the Way leaving or being ejected from the assemblies of the people of the Torah. Many of the disagreements centered around keeping wellestablished traditions or focusing on life-giving elements in the prophetic tradition. The challenge involved accepting the presentations of Jesus as authoritative or staying with the perspectives of the elders. Jesus focuses

on the ongoing work of God as key. So in the Bread Discourse, Jesus contrasts the traditional reading that Moses gave the manna in the wilderness with understanding that even as God provided manna then, God gives what is needed now for the journey into the future. With Jesus, there is a prophetic understanding that we are always leaving the slavery of false security behind and journeying through the unknown to a place of providence. He intentionally takes the crowd to a remote verdant meadow to show them the reality of reliance on God. But the crowds want to make it a reliance on him (to make him king) and he hides from them. I think we might reflect more upon what it means when Christ hides from us. He will not be a prop to make sure things work out nicely for us.

Our parish is on this journey from seeking the false security of a well-established past through the unknown to a place of providence. We receive manna along the way, like the recent grant of \$8000 from the Florida-Bahamas Synod to support the Parish TEEM Internship with Vicar Gabriel. It's just enough for now – the synod sent \$3000 upfront and will send a \$1000 per month for the rest of the year. We'll still need to match that amount. Over the fall Vicar Gabriel and I plan to trade pulpits with our Tampa Lutheran colleagues to tell the parish story and allow other pastors to experience our story. We'll look for more manna along the way. I trust that we'll raise enough to meet our need. Where I'm really focused is on what a parish of providence looks like for all who enter it. What is God doing among us to make St. Paul and Faith – to make the Lutheran Urban Parish of Tampa – a place of refreshment and restoration for all? Let's toil and labor and work on that question. It has the life of all ages in it.

And don't forget to prepare your storm kit next week. You'll be glad you have it when the time comes that you need it.

### From the Parish Deacon



Last month, on July 8<sup>th</sup>, a small group of us met at St; Paul to learn about AMMPARO and to discuss how our Parish will become a Welcoming Church. Pastor Meyer and I presented some information regarding the history of AMMPARO and the history of

ELCA's involvement regarding immigration and refugee services. Pastor Meyer also led a very informative discussion about the history of immigration laws in the United States and why there has been a surge in immigrates from South and Central America in recent years.

We also explained what it would mean to become a Welcoming Congregation. Welcoming Congregations make four commitments:

- Welcome and minister to migrants and identify a contact person in the congregation who has the language skills necessary for basic communication
- Physically accompany migrants as they make new lives in local communities;
- Pray for justice for migrants;
- Advocate for public policy that will positively impact the current immigration crisis including
  working in partnership with the ELCA Washington Office and Lutheran Immigration and
  Refugee Service on immigration reform.

Welcoming congregations will be invited to:

- Attend occasional meetings of the Welcoming Congregations Network or AMMPARO group in your synod for mutual support, fellowship and training; and
- Participate in national AMMPARO network conference calls to be updated on the current situation of the migration of children and families and receive policy updates.

Becoming a Welcoming Congregation may not require a commitment by the whole congregation but rather a commitment by the pastor, leadership and a small team of members. Welcoming Congregations are not offering shelter, employment or other financial support but simply are willing to be a church home for migrant children and families in the same way that congregations of several generations ago welcomed Lutheran migrants from Europe and helped them navigate life in their new home.

We plan on holding another meeting sometime in early September where we hope to invite other immigration advocacy organizations in the Tampa Bay Area, along with having a panel consisting of individuals who serve as immigration attorneys in the Tampa Bay Area.

We hope you will join us on this journey. We hope you will join us to do God's Work With Our Hands!

#### **Time Out**

Psalm 46:10a - "Be still, and know that I am God!"
