Pastor's article

In meditation this week we focused on Psalm 119:65-72. Medieval monks like Luther spent a lot of time pouring over the words of Psalm 119. It is the quintessential Psalm of meditation. It is the longest in the Psalter, and it is crafted in short sections for each letter of the Hebrew alphabet, summarizing the content of scripture from A to Z. It focuses especially on the great treasure of God's Word, which comes to us in several ways, and particularly in the form of commandments and promises. God's commands give us guidance for life, and the promises call us to trust God to do us good and to help in every trouble.

This section of Psalm 119 connects with the Sunday readings. We recently heard Jesus teach that "those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted" (Luke 14:11). Likewise, Psalm 119:71 reads, "It is good for me that I was humbled, so that I might learn your statutes." Another way of translating "humbled "(עַבֵּיתִי) would be "afflicted," that is, to experience stress or suffering of some kind. We often think of humility as being very self-effacing or soft spoken, but another way to think about humility in the Bible is the experience of stress, suffering, or oppression. The shocking message of Psalm 119 is that the experience of suffering can sometimes benefit us; it can open the meaning of God's Word to us in new ways. It may be painful and difficult, but there is a promise of abundant life through the narrow gate of the cross. The first part of this wise saying may sting, but the second part promises new life: "those who are brought low will be lifted up."

The congregation of Faith has experienced this kind of "humbleness" through the pain of the sanctuary fire. We have been brought low, and now we look to God's saving help to lift us into something new. "I will never leave you or forsake you" (Heb. 13:5). God is faithful, and God will act according to these words of promise. I invite the parish to pray for Faith and for clarity about our future direction. Ask the Lord to act in our midst, to do us good according to these words of promise (Ps 119:65 & 68).

I also invite the members of Faith to stay after church for a congregational meeting on September 22nd. Our purpose for this meeting is to prayerfully discern God's will for our future, to openly share ideas together, offer feedback on certain proposals, and to debrief where things currently stand. The purpose of this meeting is not for any of us to impose our own ideas or vision, including the pastors, but for each of us to offer our voice to help the body as a whole to discern God's will for our future. This will be an important conversation; don't miss out!

A quick reminder: we have Kinship Markets at Faith the first Saturday of every month, and at the Good Samaritan on the third Saturday. Bible Study is at St Paul for the month of September, on Thursdays at 6:30pm. We will be discussing the theology of James Cone as we weave our way through the Gospel of Luke. We have so far explored chapters 1 -9, and we continue to weave different passages together in our discussions each week; it is never too late to join!

Please also pray for members of our congregations who have recently undergone surgery and may need healing, for those who have lost loved ones, and for unity in our parish as the one body of Christ.

LUTHERAN URBAN PARISH OF TAMPA

The Lutheran Urban Parish of Tampa, is a united ministry of Faith and St. Paul Lutheran Churches. Our two congregations pray, work and fellowship together, pool resources, and share the same pastors. We are one body of Christ in two locations, in service to the single mission of God in our midst.



Join us for our NEW PARISH BIBLE STUDY which will meet every Thursday night at 6:30 pm. We will alternate locations every month between St. Paul and Faith. For the month of September we will meet at St. Paul.

Our first study will be on the Gospel of Luke, which will take us through the rest of the year and compliment the Sunday morning Gospel readings.

This will differ from a traditional Bible study in some ways.

For one thing, although we will go through the overall narrative of Luke's Gospel to get a sense of how it all fits together, we will not be responding to or filling out worksheets with pre-determined questions. The process will be more conversational. Secondly, our study will be interspersed with short topical studies that help us to draw connections between the text and the present time. Sometimes we will look at writers from the ancient church or the Reformation. Other times, we will look at modern authors. For example, after a few weeks of looking at the early chapters of Luke's Gospel, I would like to take a detour through the writings of James Cone, who was one of my professors in seminary at Union. His writings focus on the Gospel as a message of liberation for oppressed people, specifically for black people throughout the history of white supremacy in the United States. In this way, I hope to combine both historical and spiritual methods of reading the Bible, recognizing the historical contexts and limitations of the Bible, while also recognizing that it was written to be God's living Voice for us through the ages.

MEDITATION


All are welcome to join us for meditation that meets every Wednesday, at noon in the Sanctuary, for approximately 20-

Healthy Congregations:

Lutheran Urban Parish of Tampa Post-Call Congregational Retreat

Even so the body is not made up of one part but of many.

1 Corinthians 12:14

On August 23 and 24th several of us gathered together for our Post-Call Congregational Retreat led by the Reverend Don Reiter. Rev Reiter started the retreat letting us know that the purpose of the retreat was to "...promote healthier, stronger mission-focused congregations" and intended outcomes was that we would, "....have the tools we need to improve communication and manage conflict."

There was a discussion on the Bowen Family System Theory. My understanding is that the Family System Theory is the notion that the "family" (i.e. our church family) is an emotional system. We as individuals are actually

interdependent where the actions of any impact the action of all of us such that "All human relationships exist in a tension between two basic forces—separateness and closeness."

There is a lot I think we all learned from this experience and there is so much I could say about what was shared but I think the big "Ah Ha" for me was the discussion on self-differentiation. Rev Reiter shared a video about an "Anxious Congregation" and then another with the same characters called, "The Responsible Congregation." Both were about a change that had happened to the worship service that not everyone agreed with but the difference between the two videos was how some of the members reacted the change. In the first there was conflict that escalated; in the second there was communication and a resolution.


There were definitely some characters, both likeable and not so likeable, that I think we all have behaved like from time to time, but I think the point was that anxiety and conflict are going to happen and we must learn to deal with it in a healthy way. I think at one point Rev Reiter made the comment that we need to take responsibility for our own individual behaviors yet step outside of the situation and try to the assess how it impacts our family system. How am I contributing to this conflict and is this about what I want or the mission of my church? The picture above was a sign that Rev Reiter displayed during the retreat where he remarked (paraphrasing) that if we don't remember anything else from the retreat we should try to remember these points.

I wish more of you could have been there to experience it. Even if you

were not there, I hope you will take the time to think about the statements in the photo above. I know I am going to make an effort to take responsibility for my behavior and strive to be more empathetic with those individuals that I may disagree with by speaking to them directly and address any concern while it is still a "pinch" (i.e. minor missunderstanding) and before it escalates into something greater.

I actually think that our Lutheran Urban Parish is made up of two responsive and healthy congregations. We have our moments of anxiety and disagreements but I truly believe that we are a parish whose members are there for each other and committed to doing *God's Work With Our Hands*. I feel grateful and blessed to be a member of our Luther Urban Parish family system. I am grateful to be a part of this body of Christ.

Stewardship of our civic freedoms

Although Independence Day was a couple months ago,

this is still relevant today.

As Americans celebrated the birthday of our nation, we gave thanks for our civic freedoms of speech, religion, assembly, due process, a speedy trial, voting and many more. Our freedom has made us the envy of much of the world.

But as with any valuable gift, our civic freedoms can be abused, neglected or underappreciated to the point where, if we aren't careful, they hardly matter anymore.

Lutherans are guided by Martin Luther's insight that we are simultaneously called to be responsible citizens of "two kingdoms" — first, of God's spiritual realm, and second, of earthly governments of people and laws. The synergy of our "dual citizenship" directs us to be good stewards of our civic freedoms.

Freedom of speech: Yes, even hateful speech and lies are protected under our Constitution, but Christians avoid them in obedience to Jesus' command to love our neighbor as ourselves and by the Eighth Commandment, which Luther explains in *The Small Catechism:* "We should fear and love God, so that we do not tell lies about our neighbors, betray or slander them, or destroy their reputations." We steward this freedom by speaking honestly and insisting others do, too.

Freedom of religion: Millions of people across the globe, including Christians, face persecution and discrimination because of their faith. We dare not take our freedom for granted, but exercise it with joy and defend the rights of others to follow their own consciences.

Freedom from illegal prosecution: Our guarantees of due process in legal, criminal and civil proceedings uphold justice and guard against government misconduct. It works imperfectly, as do all human systems, but as good stewards we fight for justice and the rights for all.

Freedom of self-governance: With its interconnected checks and balances, our three-branch system of government provides stability, accountability and flexibility for change. It's a great system, but it requires us to be informed and involved. We steward this freedom by participating in political processes, voting and insisting on honest government that works for our interests.

As citizens of both God's spiritual realm and the United States of America, we renew our commitment to be good stewards of the freedoms we are privileged to have.
